# History of High School

Wewoka, before Oklahoma became a state, was nothing but an Indian trading post. No thought was given to the education of the children. They wandered around with their parents and what little they did learn was picked up by hearing other people talk.

After Oklahoma became a state, the few citizens of Wewoka thought it their duty to provide some means for the children to secure an education. An attempt was made to have school in a building down town, but this proved unsuccessful as the enrollment kept increasing and they needed a larger place.

Finally, in the year 1908, the townspeople made plans to have a regular building erected. They purchased a city block in the south part of town and bonds were sold to pay for the erection of the building. On August 25, 1908, the cornerstone was laid for the present building. In September, 1909, was the beginning of the first real school year. The enrollment then was one hundred and seventy-five; this included only nine grades as it was the year when the first year in high school was offered. A grade was then added each year for three consecutive years, so that in the year 1915 there were the twelve grades. The school was now on the road to success and in the year 1916 it turned out its first graduating class which consisted of two members.

Wewoka High School kept progressing each year and the enrollment still increased so that in 1917 the citzens purchased another block of land that was to be used as an athletic field. With the aid of the superintendents that Wewoka has had the school has made a name for herself in athletics and other school activities. She won the District Meet both in literary and athletic events at Ada in the spring 1920, and the boys took first place in the Glee Club. Along with those, the Girl's Basket Ball Team won State Championship at Edmond in 1920, and at the State Meet in Track events several of the boys won first place. In the last three years W. H. S. has won twelve loving cups and twenty-two banners.

With the untiring efforts of a few people in the school, it has succeeded in organizing an orchestra that consists of twelve pieces. It is said by many to be the best for its size in the state. Along with that a Girls' and Boys' Glee Club has been organized which has brought numerous honors to the school.

Scoring 690 points against their opponents 365 in twenty-four games, Wewoka High School boys' team finished their victorious season by giving a royal defeat in a post season game to Seminole High School boys' team. This final game was probably the roughest one in which the locals participated during the entire season and the Oklahoma City boys probably found the Tiger team when it was working better as a unit than at any other time during the entire schedule of twenty-five games.

Nineteen games were decisive victories for Wewoka and one was lost during the extra play made necessary because of a tie at the end of the second half. Oklahoma City and Shawnee were the only two teams able to administer a defeat on Wewoka's court. All others were lost when the team was on extended trips away from home.

John Campbell, George Chamblee, William Patten, Herbert Thompson, Ray Steph, and Isaac Walker, worked for the team throughout the entire season.

John Long and Clarence Kiker were eligible for only about one half of the games. Charles Miller graduated at the close of the first semester. Vernon Rogers and Mainard Kennerly worked consistently with the squad at intermittent periods of time during the season.

George Chamblee and John Campbell were placed on the All-Star first team at the East Central Invitation tournament, Ada. Vernon Rogers made the second All-Star team at Ada and John Campbell was placed on the All-Star second team at the Fourth District Oklahoma tournament held in Wewoka where the local boys ran to the semifinals where Shawnee won, from whom Sapulpa High School quintet won the District Championship after narrowly escaping defeat at the hands of the worthy Francis High School team only after four of the latter's most dependable players were ejected because of roughness in the semifinals.

Charles Miller, George Chamblee, Clarence Kiker and John Champbell all graduate this year and now just the day before the County Track Meet after having trained for the various Track events and after practically all other class "A" high school material has been declared ineligible, Mainard Kennerly reports that the family physician has advised him that he should quit athletics for all time, if he doesn't want to become an old man at twenty, due to certain abnormal physical developments.
