Jefferson Fields was born in 1884, on Honey Creek in Delaware County, Indian Territory in a log house built by General Stand Watie. He is a full blood Cherokee and lives in the White Water Creek Community, of Delaware County. His first school was Butler school and he also attended the Cherokee Male Seminary in Tahlequah, Oklahoma in 1908-1909. (Jefferson is sometimes referred to as Jess or Jeff.)
