her house on a mule. She come up and took me up.

(That's what did it!)

So I have an idea that's just about it. I don't know much else to say.

(Well, I was going to ask you long about that time. Have you more or less lived out through here, most of the time—out through Shady Grove here?)

Yeah.

(Right around this area?)

Ever since we left Arkansas:

LIKES CHEROKEE PEOPLE--ENJOYS THEIR FOOD

(So you've grown up with lot of these Cherokee people didn't you?)

Oh yeah! I learned a word or two of it. I can say (says Cherokee

word) stuff like that. (laughter)

(You can.)

(Sentence not clear) chew tobacco.

(Did you ever learn to like any of their food or anything or?)

Oh, yeah-h. You know they have--it's kind of an association or something down at this Indian church you know ever so often. I was down
there at one of them one time. They had lots of grub and stuff to eat.

(Uh-huh. Oh, you mean like--I think it's the Baptist Church--every so

often they--)

I don't know how often it is.

(A quarterly meeting they call it.)

Something like that.

(They always have big feast, don't they?)

Yeah, they have big long tables. I reckon they taken their--all cooks up there. They just stayed, you know. Take tents and campers down there.
