BURIAL PLACE OF JESSE CHISHOLM

Yes. The man on cattle drives was Chisholm. They say he is buried at the Chief Left Hand allotment right near Geary, Oklahoma. And Chief Left Hand is buried there on his own allotment. And consequently, of course, we have a lot of Chisholm markers, like that grave, motel, and Star and highway point, you know. So, the Geary people at this time are very much interested in a picture of this Chisholm. My father known him as a half-breed and probably known as a Cherokee. So, all those things, so, I have wrote to Muriel Wright to see if she could get me a picture of this Chisholm and I even ask her to have N. B. Johnson, a Cherokee--probably locate a picture for her. I thought for--maybe I would write to Boyd Pearson--

(We were talking about how the Arapahoes--what they were called back in the early days--)

WHAT THE ARAPAHOES WERE CALLED IN EARLY DAYS

Well, the Arapahoes were, of course, naturally, in English which the Crow Tribe claims are incidently my tribe, that's giving them that name and some-time Pawnees claims credit for that name. However, where the source came in is immaterial with us. Of course we don't have no "R" sound in Arapaho and-- but we were known previous to that time as part of the Blackfoot Tribe, which at that time were now known as Blackfoot. They were only known as the Paegan Tribe, That's where all these dances--these Blackfoot dance, Gourd Dance, Blackfoot, was all come from. But at that time the Arapahoes were eventually named since by the French. And when the "Gros Ventres" took out from the Arapahoes they were detected along the border between Canada and United States there somewhere there's a petrified pipe sunk in buffalo stomach where the French
