But this man Beck, G.W. Beck, he was a, a big man here and he is the father-in-law of Judge Fullerton. And he married G.W.-Clyde Fullerton married G.W. Beck's oldest daughter. And they lived out here east of town and the Fullertons, Judge Fullerton had the, had the champion male, that is, the bull of Black Angus, you know, in the whole country. He had the champion. He was the world's champion. And he was, and they raised him. He was calved out here right east of town. And they're still in the business. Boys are, he's theirs (word not clear). But, oh, I don't know, and then George Coleman, he was a big businessman here, he was Coleman and George Coleman and let's see, what's that other guy's name? Well, he was a big banker down there at El Paso when we were down there that time. I didn't get to see him.
