(Yeah, why don't you try that again?)

Say that again.

(Yeah.)

USING THE BUFFALO

Well, the buffalo is sacred to all the Indians. It's supposed to give them strength. Or it gives us clothes, make clothes out of the skin and the meat, whenever you eat buffalo meat you'll be strong and healthy. And they use it as a medicine some parts of that buffalo. And it made threads for the Indians.

(Made which for the Indians?)

Made thread, they call it sinew.

(Uh-huh.)

For the Indians to use to sew. Then they made our tipi's out of this from tipi are made from buffalo hide.

(And you compared it.)
