I don't know where they all accumulated for. (Laughter) There's been a lot of them that's accumulated but I don't know where they all come from. Course the youngsters, I guess, but I mean of the older tribe. I think when they come down there. I've got an old roll that they had and I think there was seventy-two on that roll, when they first come down there to Indian territory and settled there. But it's grown now to about seven hundred I think.

(Did anyone keep a journal at the store?)

Yes. My grand-pa. I'll have Cleve to get it for you and show it to you.

(Speaks to husband.)

It come from Kansas down here. They went to Seneca, Missouri, that's where it was at, at Seneca, Missouri.

Cleve: 'Little town right on the state line.

Uh-huh. And they were there for a while, not too long until they got the reservation up there and come up on it. But that's where they went to when they first come down here. That is my mother and her family.

Now course I can't say about more of them did. But I know what she always told me. Did you find it? I don't know where this one starts. He had one in here.
