So I'm very happy to be here. I know that, as I said before, I was shown courtesy. I want to have good white friend. I've seen where this new policy that the commissioner has sent out. We're going to live by that policy and I hope that we're going to meet the commissioner this fall. He's coming back to Oklahoma. I'm depending on the commissioner which the President Johnson has sworn him in, into the bureau. He's given him that authority by the backing of the President of the United States and I hope from here on with us Indian people, that we might better ourselves. We might be happy. We might go along. We'd like to go along with this new policy from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Robert L. Bennett. I thank you.
