If you kinda say that in Cheyenne someday and then interpret it so we can get it on the record. I like for these people to hear the Cheyenne language. And you tell what you said, O.K.?)

Nobody goin' to--

(Now Mr. Goodman is going to say something in Cheyenne and tell you what he said at the end of the tape. Alright, Mr. Goodman?)

(Mr. Goodman speaks Cheyenne for approximately ten minutes of tape.)

(The Cheyenne that Mr. Goodman told you there, was just about the latter part of his remarks that he made in his earlier speech in English.)
