Well, I would address him either as "my father," or by his individual name.

Whatever his name may be. Or call him "old man" bɛ hi. hiinɛ n

(What about your father's sister. If you were talking to your father's sister, what would you use?)

I would address her just like my uncle's wife-- nɔ hei

(If you're talking about her to someone else, what--?)

Just reverse that. When I'm addressing her I say nɔ hei hɔ Same as my uncle's wife. And same to second party-- nɔ hei

(If you're talking about her to a second party, you say nɔ hei ?)

Yeah, nɔ hei

(And then if you're talking directly to her, you say--?)

nɔ hei hɔ

(And if you're talking to your father's brother's wife, what term would you use to address her?)

I just said that a moment ago-- nɔ hei hɔ (There's some confusion here.

Father's brother's wife is probably called by same term as mother. See below-jj.)

(I thought that was your father's sister--?)

Oh--what did you say now?

(This next one I'm asking is the wife of your father's brother-- Your father's brother's wife.)

Well, that's what I'm referring to. That's the same. She's nɔ hei

(What about your father's sister?)

She's nɔ hei when I'm referring to her to a second party. But when I'm

addressing her it's nɔ hei hɔ It's just the same.
