Well I've talked to two or three lawyers and they thought the Congress could make changes.

(Congress can do, you see, when they approve this money )

Yeah.

(They can put it right in the bill, anyway they want to make it, but I'm putting this on record, too. I feel kind like you do about it. As long as your mixed-bloods and your whites are in control of your business council they're the only group the government listens to, supposedly. I mean they got the legal power.)

Yeah.

(Some way the remaining full-bloods are going to have to go to Congress and make their plea some way.)
