Luke is an amputee, having lost his leg in a car accident returning from broomcorn harvest in Colorado. He attended Okmulgee Tech and took a course in furniture repair, and has worked as a furniture upholsterer for several years. His health is fairly good, even though he had a heart attack in 1966. Luke is a full-blood Cherokee and concerned with the problems of the Cherokee people.
