BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

Luke Carey is fifty-one years old. He was born and reared in the Hulbert, Oklahoma area and still lives near his original birthplace. He attended Sequoyah Indian School and Seneca Indian School at Wyandotte, Oklahoma. He joined the CCC when he was eighteen years old and stayed for three years. Luke is an amputee, having lost his leg in a car accident returning from broomcorn harvest in Colorado. He attended Okmulgee Tech and took a course in furniture repair, and has worked as a furniture-upholsterer for several years. His health is fairly good, even though he had a heart attack in 1966. Luke is a full-blood Cherokee and concerned with the problems of the Cherokee people.
