that. It just hangs in my comb case. If you want it you can have it." I said, "I'll take it." That was back in 1916. I always try to have everything conform to the Arapaho way. I always stick to my own ways. We don't invoke nothing from the Kiowas or any other tribe--just our own Arapaho way. Maintain that tradition. I was fifty dollars for this drumstick. My nephew took it over to Wisconsin--a national Native American Church convention at Green Bay. He borrowed it and took it up and they wanted to buy it. He said, "No, it's my uncle's." He came back. He was invited out to Arizona and those places, you know. They wanted to buy it from there--he said, "No, it's my uncle's. He finally brought it back.
