you know. You turn in right there and right there is where the man lives that owns the place. He owns a lot of land in there. Got it all fenced up. I don't know his mame though.

(Well, I can find him all right. I'll go to him and ask him. But that's where your folks were settled in this territory.)

Where they lived when they raised all of us kids.

(Well.)

'Course they moved way later on.

(Yeah.)

I was small when they moved away from there. And there used to be a family graveyard there for the Gourds.

(Well now, let's see. Originally your family went by the name of Rattlinggourd.)

Well, and then they --

(That's what I had heard.)

After this country was 'lotted up they enrolled as the Gourds, you know. (I see.)

Yep. That's the way they enrolled.

Third voice: That Rattlinggourd name, Charlie wasn't it -- )

Yeah, that's right.

(Charlie stayed there and died. Right there in that Wauhillau country then.)

Yeah. See his wife was a Christie.

(Yeah.)

Third Man's voice: Jim Christie's daughter, yeah. I used to go to school with some of those girls. Jim Christie's.

Uncle Charlie is buried at Childer church.
