(Yeah.)

Don't you think there's courage in that?

(Uh-huh)

MR. SPRING FROGG LIVED IN TEXARKANA

(name not clear) she told me. He was raised right over here at Texarkana.
(Well.)

That's where he was raised. That's where he lived.

(static)

(Spring From, Yeah. He lived back on during the Civil War, I think. In fact, he died about that time.)

I never heard that name called before.

(Yeh)

I saw something in the paper two or three weeks ago on Sunday. Big write-up and pictures and so on and so forth about some fellow that was buried back-(Yeah.)

Did you see that?

(Yeah.)

They're building a gold mine out west and that stuff. I didn't know about that.

I never read anything about it.
