Yeah, we had plenty good food. Navy beans was our main dish. We had plenty to eat. Some of the boys didn't like the food. I expect some of them had more there than they did at home. I imagine they did.

(Most of them speak Cherokee?)

Yeah, most of them talked Cherokee.

(Did the school officials object to you talking Cherokee?)

No.

(Did you have two brothers in school with you when you went there?)

Just one.

(That was George?)

George.

(Did Frank ever go there?)

Yeah. After I quit there.

UTILITIES AT SCHOOL:

(You were telling me about the utilities there. What kind of lights did you have there?)

They had electric. And of course we had wood stoves. We burned wood.

(That your main heat?)

Yeah. UH-huh.

(What about your water supply?)

As we said while ago we had a farm boss there that hauled water from the spring in a big tank. And we'd carry water from the tank for our room use.
