Kechi--I think it's K-e-c-h-i, I think--

(Kechi.)

But I think it's on some map--Kechi Hill. They had rock (not clear) when we came here.

(Oh, they did?)

It must have been going 1908, because I know my older brother, one of them, anyway worked out there (inaudible).

(Imagine they made lots of buildings out of these rocks at that time?)

No, everything was wood.

(Wood huh?)

Yeah, they was getting that--grinding up there, for I think gravel and stuff like that. It was near at this spot here, you know. It was over here about half a mile, three quarters on where the railroad come by.

(Back in the Osage county where they had the rock (inaudible). They built all out Agency buildings and school building with this tone--this native stone.
