(First part of sentence inaudible) hadn't been-showing you at that intersection. I didn't see that road. I knew it should be there. But it didn't look like it--wasn't Indian City looking down at this valley-(It certainly is a beautiful sight. I imagine the Delawares lived out in here didn't the, Caddoes up in there, Wichitas are somewhere around here.)

This is mostly Kiowas and Caddos, and Plains-Comanches lives out here. I believe--I don't know if it's mostly Kiowas now or them Comanches in here or not. Course Lawton is Comanche, the end of it you know because they got that hospital.

(Doctors and all that.)

Yeah in there. But a lot of Comanches drifted up here seem like. Caddos I guess and Kiowas.

(Well, that Riverside is on that Delaware on that land around Riverside.)

Did they own it--the Delaware?

(Yeah.)

I didn't know it. Well, I thought--I guess the Delaware were here--I thought maybe, you know west you get in the Arapaho--Cheyenne northwest.

(Yeah.)

Yeah, I guess the Caddo--like Caddo County was named after that I guess--Caddo Tribe.

(This concludes this tape and a later time I hope to visit the families surrounding the area of this cemetery and find out any more about the people.—
about the customs and about the ceremony that they went through with the--last ceremonies of the people. And I think it would be very interesting to know how they--Comanches held their ceremonies for the final rites. And so at this time we conclude this tape.)
