Woman's voice: (Yeah, our fathers went way up there near the Kansas line, and way back in those days it was a long trip down here. I don't know how come they met Quannah Parker, but it seems like they came down to a peyote meeting he was running and they talked of that oh, ever since I can remember.)

Is that right.

Woman's voice: (They said he was just outstanding, you could tell he was, you know, and they always talked of him but one thing they always laughed about him that after the Peyote meeting was over, they said they having a dance nearby, but you two old folk men you get back up to your country, sisters. Those people down here, brought medicines, and everything and just went back so they did, they didn't go that dance and they went back up to -- back home, but they always laughed about that after that. They said he was a slick type, spectacular.)

I guess he was. That's what I heard too.
