It always hurts right there. It looks like something in there, and move around---

Maggie: Yeah, I had that trouble, Faye, we was talking about. You know, it just look like it's shaking, you know.

(You think it's your nerves or you think maybe it's your intestines?)
I guess, that's what they blow something trying to--blood get out.
(Making sounds of heart pumping), all the time.

(Oh.)

I just can't hardly sleep. I can't lay down on that way.

Maggie: Huhhh, that's the way I am. I can't lay down on this side.

(Does it hurt? Does it hurt, Aunt Suzie, on that side?)

No.

Maggie: No, you just give out, ain't it. You just don't feel right, ain't it?

Yeah.

Maggie: That's the way I get. I don't feel right. I can't lay on this side, Faye.

(Just lay on that other side?)

Maggie: Yeah.

And I--sometimes when I feel too bad, I go to hospital, just stay there little while, and---

(Until you feel better, huh?)

Maggie: Yeah, she does rest down there when she go up there little while.
You do get worried of home. You just have to stay away from them little while, though.
