

lesser offenses. One of the old Indian Court Houses was near Achille, Oklahoma and was called Rock Springs Court House. This was a two-story structure, made of logs with the "Hanging Tree" growing out in the yard near the building. It is no longer in existence.

Mr. Duncan feels that he was one of the more prosperous children because their home was made of split logs and had a wide front porch and wood floors (plank he calls them) and beds very much like what we have today. Their diet consisted mostly of corn and its products. One of the particular foods that he recalls, is "Tom Fuller". This was made of corn, boiled as if to make hominy, then put in jars and left for several days to sour and the juice to thicken. They ate this with what he called a "Tom Fuller Spoon". His description--"Take a cow horn, scrape until it is clean, then boil, then take the part that fastened on to the head of the cow (the widest part) and split on either side and take out the middle part which leaves the rest in the shape of a scoop." This was what they dipped in the "Tom Fuller" to eat with. They also had lots of Pashofa, which was corn and fresh meat cooked together with whatever seasoning they might have available.

When asked how they were allotted certain amounts of land, Mr. Duncan says that they were allowed a certain amount of money and given land equal to that amount. His original allotments were 140 acres at Kemp, Oklahoma, and 90 acres east of the present town of Cumberland, Oklahoma. Both of these were sold by the
