The Cherokee village further north would be built different from a Cherokee village further South, because of the climate change.

(The different winds etc.)

Right. So, the Cherokees built they're homes according to their environment and this is true of any ancient people, so not only De Sota but other Spanish explorers, the English explorers,

(Coronado?)

Right. Timberlake, they all wrote about these inhabitants.

(Uh-huh)

And this is where we get our research work, or I mean our material, our research material, first from these white people.

(Uh-huh)

The Cherokees, themselves, don't know where they came from. So, I think people if they become more enlightened about their culture and the only way they can do this is through books.

(Uh-huh, well now Sequoyah came on the scene along, not too long before removal.)

Sequoyah, was already here in the Western lands when the bulk of the Cherokee people came over.

(Uh-huh)

He had already been here for quite sometime.

REACTIONS BY SOME PEOPLE WHO HAVE SEEN THE DRAMA

(When that controversy started waging, then he came on out.)

Uh-huh. So, as far as the 'Trail of Tears,' is concerned, there's a lot of things that are in it, that are not accurate historically. Of course this was put in to make it more appealing to the audience. To give it uh ...to make it more dramatic. People, when they want to see something they want to straight history, be entertained. If we just had straight facts, it wouldn't be entertaining.
