BACKGROUND ABOUT SELF, DR. UNDERWOOD

Marty, thank you, I'm very happy to be here. One of the things that I observed was, that normally in my classes, you know I have four participations, after the parent sending them here to pay the tuition, and I insist that they come to class, otherwise, I don't give them a good grade. And I can say after seeing this turnout tonight that this is exactly 99% more people than I thought would be here. At any rate, I think I think, probably the agenda that I'll follow for the evening will be something like this:
