before, Benjamin S. Calpot, a supervisor here at the Cherokee Nation.

Mr. Benedict inherited a very well organized system of education. The administration setup, it would have been credit to some states. However, the Federal Government felt that it lacked sufficient authority and that it was, there were a number of things that should be heard. Consequently, supplementary agreements were made that all, that were made, that all it took educational matters completely out of the hand of the Indians. For instance, section 22, the Cherokees suffered briefly, ratified August 7, 1902, provided that the Cherokee schools shall be used under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior.
