

(Was there one called Dupree?)

Yes. It's where that--I think it's a brick building now that Dupree.

And there was Pheasant Hill.

(Pheasant Hill.)

Pheasant Hill church. Remember where that was?

/second female voice: That's where Mary taught her first school./

(Well.)

Yeah, it was after it burned down. Then they built a little school house northeast of the old building. It was out on the prairie.

(Was that near what used -- I mean where there used to be a post office and store they called Woodley.)

Well, Woodley was farther north.

(It was further north, then.)

About a mile north on the west side of the road.

(I see.)

And Eureka--you went past Woodley and turned and the next section and went west. Now let's see--I believe there's a little Indian school.

I don't know when it was established, but I taught there in about 1913 or 1914. No, must have been about '12.

(1912.)

'12. And that was called Fallin school.

(Fallin.)

After Gilbert Fallin. It was a government school. But they had a few white children there. And then there's the White Oak school.

(Yeah, White Oak.)

And Kelley was an Indian school next. I guess about a mile and a half or two miles something like that. And then the Timber. And there's Blue Hawk, I've never been there.

(Blue Hawk.)

Blue Hawk. I've never been there. That was south. I don't know
