(I guess there was lots of good hunting in those days.)

Lots of hunting yeah. They said the grass used to be so much higher. Way up around -- on up around your waist.

(Well, my goodness. You'd never know that now to look at the country, would you?)

No, you sure wouldn't.

(Well, how did they make aliving when they were --)

Oh, just hunt mostly.

(I guess they traded too.)

They trade their corn and rias their corn and stuff like that. That's about all they lived on.

WILD GAME WAS PLENTIFUL IN EARLY DAYS

Third male voice: There was lot of game in here then too. Turkeys and deer, I guess.

(Oh yeah.)

Rabbits. Coon. They don't eat possum. Indians wasn't much on eating possum.

(No, they weren't. Indian women they could eat coon.)

Third male voice: Coons is good, I think.

Oh yeah, coon's good. My mother used to cook'em. Now lot of people think skunks wasn't any good. They are.

Third male voice: I guess they are. I never did taste of one. They tell me that (sentence not clear) liked squirrel. Red (not clear)

(You know the Endian women they could fix anything.)

Oh gosh, yeah.

(They just seem to have a knack for it.)

Corn that's one of their main foods. That is, among the Delawares, and all Indians as far as that goes. Pumpkin.
