Man speaks: No, we had a store here, the last one. The Summers had a store, and Hensley and Mayberry. Then, Mallery was the postmaster.

Adelaide: No, they didn't have post offices at Mallery Store. They did away with that post office a long time ago. I can't remember when. I guess Mayberry was the last one, post office. I'm not sure, but I believe it was Mayberry. We used to get mail on Route 4. We lived on that.

(Railroad agent was named Douglas. You know, it's hard to believe that one of the little communities like Sageeyah was a little town. There were a few stores, post office, and the depot, stockyard. Did they ever have a mill here nearby?)

No, that I know of.

#### EARLY DAY CHURCHES

(The first church here was the Presbyterian church, and, now, it's the Baptist, isn't it?)

No, the Presbyterian church was always Presbyterian and the other church up there was the Baptist, and, now, it's the Assembly of God church. The Baptist sold it to them, and they built themselves a new church at the new highway. Baptist bought that church up there.
