Everett Yellowman has the job of lining out the specials.

It is announced that the El Reno Pow-wow would be next week-end. The Kiowa-Apache-Blackfoot group will dance Friday afternoon.

Cut to special song composed by James Anquoe, Sr. This song may be the one which introduces the special for James Anquoe, Jr. by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Roe Hamilton. The words of the song, which is in Kiowa, mean "I am happy because my son has returned." This song was made after Ducky (James Anquoe, Jr.) returned from the armed forces.

These special songs are processional. They are slow. The family and friends of the person being honored dance in procession with him around the arena.

This special is for James Anquoe, Jr. and given by the Hamilton's. Ducky is their son-in-law and they are honoring him with this special because he is the head man dancer of this pow-wow. They give away a lot of blankets and shawls. Marga, Ducky's wife and daughter of the Hamiltons, joins her parents in the giveaway. She carries her things she will give away in Mexican carrying bags. Jess Rowledge, Agnes Hamilton's father, dances in the processional.

Henley announces for Everett Yellowman to get ready for the Pete Birdchief special.

Henley announces for everyone to gourd dance. There will be four more gourd dance songs.

The gourd dancing concludes. There is no Buffalo Dance at the end today.
