

(Do you know anything about Crazy Hill?) Crazy Hill is just west of the bridge across the Washita west of Ft. Cobb. The hill is on the south side of the road, State Highway 9.

I don't know if you heard it. This is the story I heard. About two men, one of them jealous of the other. This man that took this man's wife, he met up there, just west of that hill there. This guy was looking for his horse, and this guy was gone home, I guess. Anyway, they met right there, and this guy killed him. That's why they call it Crazy Hill. That's the only story I know. Other than that, I don't know.

(Aren't some of the Indians kind of afraid of it?)

No, that's just hearsay. There's nothing superstitious about that. It's just where a man killed another man. They go by that name, Crazy Hill. It ain't crazy, but it's a word in dialect is he'ete'eliska. Well, he'ete means you do something without thinking, that murder. There's murder involved. For my peoples, there's murder committed up on that hill, that's he'ete. Eliska means hill. That's all it is. Other than that...some people what I heard what you said. I heard people said there's something superstitious, spooky, you know. This happened, I don't know what year it was, but Apache men told me and my grandfather told me. They just refer to it as Crazy Hill.

(Did the Indians use to camp down there?)

Back..you know where Sadie Nestell lives. Right back north and east of there. Used to camp in there. That's when Fort Cobb, the story I got, they call it kohadidee. That's the name of Ft. Cobb, in Apache. Where there's a lot of this...some kind of a plant, grows in water. Look like
