(Don't hardly do that now, do they?)

No. They don't do that anymore. That's awful. But they sure did care for sick folks in those days.

(They did?)

Uh-huh.

(Oh.)

Even though there was no Christians. But my mother was.

(She was a Christian?)

Uh-huh.

(Oh.)

My daddy wasn't. But he took us to church, association or any where they had big meeting, he used to take us. We had good team you know--wagon. And we sure used to go.
