(Did it help you?).

Yeah. It helped us.

(Did you all have very many doctors then -- Indian doctors?)

Yeah, lot of them. Good ones. But there aren't any now.

(Where did they get them herbs and roots and stuff?)

Out of the ground.

(Just around the house?)

No they go off different places.

(They go off to get it?)

Not too far.

(Oh.)

(Creek words) -- in a wagon. And we'd have lunch to eat on the way. And we went way down south of here, you know. Chipalka (?), I reckon. We went down there in wagon.

(Close to Holdenville. That's long ways.)

TRAVEL BY WAGON - BEGINNING OF THE ASSOCIATION

Yeah, long ways. We stayed all night at Dustin, come on back. We went to place where they had big tabernacle (not clear). Close to Proctor they call it—it was a Post Office—Proctor was, and it was south of that right close to a big stream. And there was whole lot of people went there. And we went there after mother died. And so papa took us there. We went all camped together there. Dave Cummings and all of them was there. Wesley Smith, and Jim Byrd and Mr. Brown, Horse Hide, I guess his name was—Phillips. They all went down there. I guess that was first time starting of association (not clear)—to camp there. So they had a little Altar, made to cook you know. And Lucy Dunson, Irene Cummings, and Lena Benson they were the treausries. I don't remember who was the president, though. And they had a little place where they cook you know. (Creek words) And they cook there. I was out
