And there was just three of them that danced. Yeah, and This Noble, he was the one that set it up. And Bill Williams and Frank Charcoal. That was the only two that went in with him. They were the ones that danced with him.

(And it was Nobel--?)

Noble Prentice put it on. Yeah. And they call this place "Noble's Last Stand."

(What about the time before that -- I guess it would be two years before that, that they had another one. Do you remember if very many people participated then?)

Oh yes, there was a lot of tents. Even some Wyoming people were here. And there was lot of dancers. I wouldn't remember who all was dancing. It was close to the river there at the doing's place (of Dillon's)--(?) That's what it was.

(Did people have any idea, back when they had this last one, that it might be the last one they had?)

No, they didn't know that was the last one. But it was the last one.

(What time of year was it held?)

It was in the fall. It was in August, I think, when they had it over here. In forty (1940). And we used to walk from here.

(And that old man Ute was still there at that time?)

He was there. And Plenty Bear was there.

(Did they put up a big lodge or anything?)

It was a big lodge, but there was just three of them. It seemed like--I don't know--maybe people just got tired of this old man putting up Sun Dance every year.
