that's back about two miles east and a mile south. He met him down there horseback. And he--Mr. Wright lived here then, spent the rest of his life here. (Words not clear.) belonged to the Cherokees. All of his kids got the allotment.

(Yes mam.)

Especially Braham.

(Well!)

They went down there, visited him. Mr. Wright's father was named Cornelius Wright. And he's buried there at Barren Fork. We visited his grave. Now this cemetery, out here like I say, it started out as a family cemetery. Then after that, he deeded it to the Methodist church back in 1914 but they never did go ahead and build a church. They just held Sunday School and church in the Browning Springs school house. These school houses I'm sure burned over there.

(Browning Springs?)

Browning Springs.

(I mean Browning Springs. Now that was in this area that the government took over too?)

Uh-huh.

(What other schools, early day schools were down in this part of the county?)
Well, there was that--years and years ago there was a school house on the
east of the creek. This Browning Springs school house wasn't always over
here at this place. It used to be further back down, just a mile south
from here for awhile. See the school house burned. And then they built
it back over there or moved the school house over there where Browning
Springs is. Then on the east side of the creek about two or three miles
south on the each side, there was a school house by the name of Slapout.

(Well)
