(Why I guess there's a lot of folks lived there at one time but compared to what it is now.)

Oh yeah there was but you know, there's some trailor houses moving in up here now and a lot of Indians are in there. They are coming back. (Yeah, those Indians had a lot of land over there west of you then.) Well they-we've got 240 acres of land in allotment and --I think 160 back over in that there around Adair. That was an Indian land, too. Let's see, Miss Hannah and the -- Tommy and Roland and Levi, Joe, did I call Bill, did I name Bill? I said did I call Bill?--I think there was ' nine allotments that they had.

Third voice: Lawrence, and Herb and Clyde and that (not clear) Alvin: Roland Hannah lives out southwest (words not clear). He has a place down there, I think he bought it, along with this over here. He's the only one left that lives around here and he had a Hammond funeral up here last, when was it? -- last Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday? There's been shootin' here.

OUTLAWS COME FROM MISSOURI

Ever since I--nothing bad like it was over there in Missouri way down there. Elmer Tate gang in south west of Missouri they lived up there close to Muskogee at that time and I believe it was the Dalton boys, or -some outlaws, they say they always take that --he carried several boxes of Windchester shells from that public store over there on the railroad and hid out. They sent after them--these boys afraid not to get them. (That's right.)

(I guess that river was a good hiding place at one time for outlaws.) Boy I'm telling you that would be a good hiding place yet. (You bet it would.)
