organization or the Methodist. At that, back then they didn't give him a salary?)

Huh-uh. No.

(For these little Indian mission churches?)

No, not that way then. No, they didn't get anything from them.

(So it was up to the people to pay him?)

Uh-huh. Yes. Just all the Christians here, they'd have something sell just like I said.

(Like quilting, pie suppers?)

Uh-huh. Yeah, sold quilt or something to eat--anything like that.
That's the way they got the money up to pay the pastor.

(Well, do the churches of today--do they still have those quilting bees? I mean place where they quilt?)

Yeah. Some places they do. And out there to Swimmer—to my church, they still do it but there's three or four of them goes. But they still quilt and gets the quilts out. It's still going. But I don't have no way to go so I don't never have been to help them. Course I can't sew anyway because when I had my heart attack or stroke or whatever I had, the doctor told me not to sew anymore. So that's my last sewing. I don't do no sewing here at home. Have to depend on my girl to do the sewing. Since then I've just kind of gone down to nothing. Since I had my sick spell and I ain't able enough to do anything other than that.

(When was that, Mrs. Hair?)

Well, I guess that's been about two or three years now. I guess when I had that. And since one time since we've been living here, something struck me. I couldn't talk. So they took me to the doctor but I got all right though. What you call that--might have
