They dry them and then they shell them off and then they put them in a bag. Boy they got a good smell to them. Fragrance.

RATTLES:

(There is one of those rattles.)

Yeah. They use them rattles. Some old men use them. They hang them up.

Whenever they are fresh like this. You get them at that stage when the

worms don't get them. You hang them (plant species not known) up and

when they dry, they're perfect. You shake them. You get them while they're
