Julius: There was two little old schools right on main street; one right north of the store used to be and one right four miles up the creek there.

Mrs. Pennington: Uh, yes, I taught a school north of the Martin cemetery. It is in Nowata county but there's no school there anymore. They've consolidated with Childers, and now Childers has been abandoned too.

(Yes, it's abandoned too. It's a big school there.)

Mrs. Pennington: Julius's brother-in-law and sister taught in Childers for about, I forgot, 12 or 13 years.

(Was there a school called Cockleburr in this county?)

Yes.
