And they got over in here. Right there where she died is where she spent her adult life.

And the people that was in charge of the train, you know, the wagons and things, told'em--told the guards. That was the people that was supposed to been guarding them. Now just let'em go. Don't try to get'em back 'cause they'll starve to death anyway.

(Yeah.)

And they didn't.
