long time. Great, big stout fellow. Sure stout. Had white complexion, though.

(It's light up there, north.)

Yeah.

(bwn here South, it's hot. Sun-we get dark down here. Worse down there in New Mexico or Arizona.)

Yeah, I got acquainted. I stayed with them boys all the time.

But there's one Arapaho Indian, bunch of 'em. They're fixing that school building. Tore one side up. Have a room away from both buildings. I went up there. Used to sleep up there sometimes.

Cheyennes from down near Arapaho. He slept with us. So, I slept with them, too. And they had gourd, they'd sing peyote songs.

That's where I learn Peyote songs. I never did sing 'em, though. I know 'wm all, but I never sing 'em here.

JESSE ROWLODGE

Man I got acquainted with, name was Jesse Rowlodge. I don't know whether he's down there yet or not.

(Yeah, he's there.

Is he?

(Uh-huh.)

I was acquainted with him. Sundays we go-when I used to go to school with them boys, I go to Sunday school with him. Two times we had to have dime or fifteen cents. After we was through with Sunday school, we got in bakery shop and get fifteen cents of cookie, and come home. Then I know another man name Jessie Wilburn. I think he passed away. And Wakefield Blackburn, Cheyenne. I been wanting to see Jesse Rowlodge, but I ain't got not way of going. If you do, I'd like to see him. Go to him while I'm living. (If I ever run across him, I'll tell him. I go down there all the time. Go down there to that exposition. I go out west sometimes.
