willing, why, "Go ahead. Go clean it while we--" They used to go ahead and have their hand games.

(Did they give them a smoke when they asked them?)

No, they used to just go ask them. But these peyote people, they give smoke to the ones they ask.

(Would this lady get any pay for having a hand game?)

No. They don't used to pay them. They just used to have good time. And oh, when they have hand games they used to just play, you know. They used to have lot of fun. But now, if anybody get up and jump around, they say, "Oh, she's crazy!" They always say that. But them old hand games, boy, some of them used to go on their knees and just play with their sister-in-laws or brother-in-laws--anything like that. They used to have lot of fun.

TEASING BROTHERS- AND SISTERS-IN-LAW

(What do you mean by playing with their sisters-in-law or brothers-in-law?)
Oh, they try to beat them, you know. "You--I'm going beat you!" And all that, you know. And they'd say, "I'm gonna make medicine!" Oh, they used to hit the ground and it was good to see! Yeah, this hand game is lot of fun among Indians. They all like it. Now them Kiowas over there--we went down there and play with them one time. They call themselves "Roadrunners."
We played with them. We beat them down there. Then they come up here and we couldn't beat them--they beat us.

(Back when you were young, was there just certain times to play hand games?)

Oh, any time, you know, at night when there ain't nothing to do, they ask somebody to run hand game. And they used to have hand games any time, you know, of the week--any time of the day they played. Especially when it's cold, during the winter. They used to play every night. And they used to have all kinds of these wild fruit gravies, fry bread. Some would bring meat
