They used to--there was one store over here--that's where they used to buy. But I don't know where they bought other things, but they used to buy them here. And they wasn't no fifteen, twenty dollars for pots--twenty-five cents, or fifteen or fifty cents maybe.

(What was the name of that store do you remember?)

The name of the man who used to own that store--his name was Abernathy.

(Was that close to the Agency?)

Yeah, close over here.

#### BIRDS EATEN

(Did they ever used to get any birds--like turkeys and so forth?)

Wild turkeys. They used to say they get wild turkeys. I never did see wild turkeys. And then over ther toward Okeene they used to say they'd get these sage hens. I never did eat a sage hen, and I never did eat wild turkey. I can't eat turkey--it's too dry.

(Did they have chickens back then?)

No. No chickens.
