(I think it really is a good plan.)

Alice: There's a lot of them like that. We got a full blood son.

He can do anything. (Sentence not clear.) They say that they have a way of proving their own (words not clear).

Yes, they have. They fought these head rights. A good many people

has just bought them for an investment of the minerals of the Osage

county. Now we--it has been discussed a few times. I have talked to

some geologist who really know what they're talking about. It said

that there's from 50 to 70% of the oil still left in the ground today.
