Wyandottes go from this river down here to Missouri line. Close

to Seneca. And the tribal line is right out there till you cross

it. You go to that cemetery.

(Yeah.)

About a mile or so south, they don't own much land in here.

Then the Cayugas, they dropped in here. So they got some small

plots. I believe there was thirteen different tribes. See, there's

four different tribes in Miami.

(Well.)

When we come to this country, there was the Peorias. And there

was the Miami and about five or six families of Potawatomias.

And then there was the... There was about three different tribes.

I went with two different girls. It was long ago. Neither one of

them married me. Anyway, I didn't marry none of them.
