brother...Later he was married just as /words not clear/. She died.

And he married into the Edwards family. One of them /words not clear/.

I've forgotten what the names were. But anyway, papa—Mr. Wright then, he liked it up in this part of the country and Fort Gibson. So, he came up here and moved up into that neighborhood. And he was going to be married a second time. Marry this Mary Archer from over at Pryor. And her father was this—He was from New York. And really, he was a Catholic priest. And he married I've forgotten what the name of the family of Archers. Well, one of them—At home with Mr. Wright. He lived in a home up there. And that's the only home of all our homes I think that's standing.

(Well.)

And then--

(Well, then they did have a store and church at Oowella.)

They had a store down there and a post office edge of town. And then they had the Oowella school. But after statehood the other people begin to—the children growing up and leaving, you know. That is, so many of the Indian families. That they went on—like my mother now. My father died in 1906. And they were married in 98. I believe it was.

(Yeah.)

Children-big families-with out family. And the McCoy family.

MORE ABOUT WELL KNOWN FAMILIES - DEDAWARES

(Well, there must have been lot of families up along that river there.)

Bill McCoy family. They were all Indians. Then there was a Mrs.

Tracer. Her first husband was a Payne. She had two boys. And Mr.

Payne was working for John Foreman. There was a Mr. John Foreman.

He was a brother to Taylor Foreman. And he had two daughters, Rosalee and --

(Foreman married McClelland.)
