every day to the grocery store. So we went to their reception. And it was before his daughter was married. And I remember as went through with a group there, Mrs. Roosevelt and Alice were standing—

(Quite an experience to meet the president.)

Oh, yes, it certainly was. And we went to Mt. Vernon. And everyday we went somewhere, some affair.

(Were you going to a college there at Petersburg?)

It's called a Southern Ladies College. Petersburg, Virginia. It wasn't a very large school, but it was wonderful outside.

SHE HAS WONDERFUL MEMORIES

(Well, you've had a wonderful--lot of experience in your time. You work. You spent many years working here in Rogers county, too.)

Yes. I taught. Then I was city clerk and I taught in school here.

And then after my mother wasn't well, I-- Then after the war, I worked as a Red Cross worker. Supervisor of the work, you know. They have a sewing room.

(Yes. Well, you've known a lot of people in your time.)

Sometimes. Yesterday was a reunion. Oolageh - you know that.

(Yes.)

But I didn't go to that.

WASHINGTON COMMUNITY - PEOPLE AND PLACES - SCHOOLS

(Another place in Rogers county that I have always been interested in and know very little about and that's what they call the old Washington community. Way up on Dog Creek.)

Yes. And that's due, you might say, kind of east of Chelsea: (Yes.)

We used to go through there when we were going to Pryor before they-over that bridge it was, and see that Washington school house. -And it's-- and they call that up to the Washington district.

(Yes, ma'am. Must have been a lot of Indians that lived in there
