at one time.)

Yes. And they were a lot of Henrys. There were Henrys and Bill Burgess. He isn't an Indian, but he lived up in that neighborhood. He bought some land up there. And I think I read at the time about a lot of different people in different parts of the country.

(And some of the Tincups were up in that part of the country at that time, too.)

Tincups.

(But I don't -- let's see.)

That's kind of southeast of Chelsea. I was trying to think...

(Yes, ma'am.)

Here's Chelsea. Here's Buchyhead. There was a little school just east of Bushyhead. They called it Gladd.

(Gladd.)

Gladd. There was a Gladd family that lived, it was kinda northeast of Foyil. And this Gladd school was just kinda east of Bushyhead. It was a log school house. That was my first school. I'll never forget it.

(Well, I've never heard of that one before.)

Gladd. And they had several years. Then they didn't have any schools around it.

(Now, was that the only school up in that part of the country?)

Yes. That was Gladd. And of course they had a school in Chelsea.

But the community up in that Beck. There's a bunch of Becks up there.

(They we're Shawnees, weren't they?)

No, they were Cherokees...

(Oh, were they? They were on up north there a little way.)

No. They lived on the lake around Bushyhead.

(Around Bushyhead. That's right. They had a little family cemetery up there.)
