Here it says, the Caddo and the Delaware usually danced together on Boggy Creek. The Wichita and the Kechai, who took the doctoring from the Caddo, usually danced together on Sugar about 15 miles from the agency at Anadarko. But manifested less interest in the matter until Sitting Bull came down about the beginning of February 1891 and gave the feathers to the leaders. See, that's what I told you a while back. It says all these tribes went into the matter heart and soul; on some occasions dancing for days and nights, together from the middle of the afternoon until the sun was well up in the morning. See, that's on the last night. That's a mistake there. The usual custom was to continue until midnight. Cold weather had no deterrent and in fact, they kept up the dance in the snow. The tranced subjects sometimes, lying unconscious on the snow for half an hour at a time. Now, that's what I was telling you about that. Cause I got that marked off there.

TRANCES DURING THE GHOST DANCE:

(Did the Caddo ever go in trances like that?)

Some of them did:

(What sort of things did they do while they were in a trance? How did they act?)

Well, they just when they go into trance why they just fall and lay there and whenever they get up they tell whatever the vision was that they saw.

(Did you ever see them?)

Oh, yes, I've seen them.
