Oh.

(Well, I guess if you never hear of it. But like you say we had some laws to follow to get along with each other. How many clans do you recall that these Osages had.)

Oh, let's see, there was the Bear clan--

(Bear, huh?)

Bear clan.

(Oh.)

Deer clan, Buffalo clan, and there was a bunch of them. Fish clan and different animals. You can't marry into your clan, either.

(Oh.)

Like if in your own clan, they were call sister and brother. Fish clan and different animals. If you go and try and marry into one, they won't let you. It's the same as your own sister and your own brother.

(Oh, I see.)

You see now, now that the old people are gone I see different ones marry into same clan, close relation.

(You know back there did you ever hear your folks talk about Osages when they lived in Kansas or Missouri. There were a lot of other Indians around there did they ever come in with--I mean marry into our tribe, back there like they do now.?)

No, I don't think so. But now one thing I do remember; my cousin told me and my mother told me too. One time they say they capture a white boy in fighting white people. They capture one of the baby--small baby. And grandpa raise him. Raise him. He got along--while he was growing. He watch the way they do. They had him, while he got big enough. They had him carry wood, water horses (not clear) and learn, and put on Indian clothes and do
