Harvey, H. History of the Shawnee Indians. 316 pp. Cincinnati, 1855  
This is one of the best sources on Shawnee history and culture before 1855. It is written by a missionary who worked among the Shawnees but who did a great amount of research on Shawnee history. This is an old and rare book. There is a copy of it in the Phillips Collection of the university library.

Hodge, F. W., ed. Handbook of American Indians North of Mexico. Bulletin 30 of Bureau of American Ethnology. In 2 volumes. 1907 and 1910. Encyclopedic compilation of material relating to all Indian tribes of the United States and Canada, including tribal histories, biographical information on well-known Indian people, and information on material culture and social life and customs. For information on the Shawnees, look under such entries as: "Shawnees," "Tecumseh," "Tenskatowa," "Big Jim," etc. This is a good basic reference work and compilation of information on American Indians up till 1910. Should be available in the Public Library and University Library, but probably cannot be checked out as it is considered a reference book.

Hunt, C. T. The Wars of the Iroquois. 209 pp. Madison 1940.  
This book has some information on movements of Shawnee groups, and the participation of the Shawnees in the Indian wars.

Joseph, Alvin M., Jr. "These Lands are Ours..." American Heritage, Vol. 12, No. 5, August 1961.  
This is an article on Tecumseh and his times, and is based primarily on Glenn Tucker's book, Tecumseh, Vision of Glory (See below on this list). However the article is concise and well written, and illustrated with several attractive color pictures and one color map.

McKenney, T. L., and Hall, J. History of the Indian Tribes of North America. 2 volumes. Originally published Philadelphia, 1848. New edition published Edinburgh, 1933.  
This work has color reproductions of paintings of famous Indian leaders, mostly from eastern and midwestern tribes. Also has text consisting of biographical sketches and anecdotes of these chiefs. Volume 1 has five Shawnee chiefs: Kishkewa, Tenskwentaww, Quatswapa or Colonel Lewis, Paytakoota or Flying Clouds, and Catahacassa or Black Hoof. Their pictures are included along with biographical information on them. This book available in the university library.

Swanton, J. R. Early History of the Creek Indians and Their Neighbors. Bulletin 78 of Bureau of American Ethnology, 1922.  
Has short section on the Shawnee tribe and scattered references to Shawnee groups among the Creeks and some possible Shawnee towns.

Swanton, J. R. Indians of the Southeastern United States. Bulletin 137 of Bureau of American Ethnology. 1946.  
Best compilation of material of the various tribes of the southeastern part of the United States, and includes material on the Shawnees, especially those Shawnee groups and towns in the Southeast.
